Meet a Community Garden

CELC Community Garden

The Columbus Early Learning Center (CELC) Community Garden is dedicated to improving food access and educational opportunities for families at the Champion Learning Center and the surrounding community. Our mission is to introduce healthy, fresh food into our community's diet while providing an outdoor learning environment for our students. We are proud to have received the Harvest Award in 2023 for Education Garden of the Year.

Each of the two preschool classrooms at the Champion Learning Center has its own 3'x 5' garden plot outside the classroom windows, allowing preschoolers to easily observe their garden's daily growth. The children regularly visit the garden to water plants, harvest produce, and engage with the garden, encouraged to ask questions about their sensory experiences.

The CELC Community Garden incorporates various educational elements from the curriculum. Preschoolers practice measuring the height of sunflowers and weighing cucumbers, while also using vegetables for color lessons. Teachers lead science experiments where children slice open produce like cherry tomatoes to observe what's inside.

Daily care of the garden deepens the children's understanding of where food comes from and the time involved in growing it. They enjoy sharing the harvest with classmates and taking produce home to their families, fostering collaboration and a sense of accomplishment. Overall, the garden provides a meaningful, long-term learning experience that engages children at the Champion Early Learning Center.
